WE'RE DOING POWERFUL WORK... BUT WE CAN'T DO IT ALONE.

Since 1949, the Kansas City Metropolitan Crime Commission has worked behind the scenes to support law enforcement efforts in the Kansas City metropolitan area. We are a non-profit organization that fights for the security of the entire greater Kansas City area on both sides of the state line by operating innovative programs that help us power a safer, better Kansas City community. Here are just a few of our program's recent successes:

Our Greater Kansas City Crime Stoppers program is credited with saving the lives of 19 students from suicide attempts, and averting at least 2 potential mass school violence incidents in local schools through its Scholastic TIPS initiative. The Scholastic TIPS system is modeled after the TIPS Hotline and allows students to anonymously share information without fear of retribution. Students have utilized this resource (available via phone, web, text, free mobile app and QR Code) to save the lives and prevent harm to fellow students by submitting anonymous TIPS.

MCSP connects adjudicated individuals with established partner worksites to fulfill their court-ordered service, thus providing meaningful opportunities that have a profound impact on our community. MCSP also conducts weekly clean-ups along the streets of targeted high-crime areas of the community.

SAFE has provided financial support to **44 families of fallen first responders and 1 surviving first responder.** The immediate support helps when the bills don't stop. Nearly \$100,000 in scholarships have been paid to the children of first responders. Ongoing support is paid during the holidays to 28 families with 27 children.

Second Chance asks justice-impacted community members to "take a chance on change" and become self-sufficient. Those who do are glad they did, as 75% (since 2013) of them are now successfully employed, productive members of society. Our community benefits, too, as we are all safer and saving over \$69 million taxpayer dollars every year that Second Chance participants are not incarcerated.

Crime Stoppers continues to see an increase in homicide TIPS as a result of increasing the reward to \$25,000 in KCMO, which has led to the solving of 26 total homicides since 2019. In the 2025 calendar year so far. Crime Stoppers has received over 735 TIPS resulting in 10 arrests, 24 cleared cases, and \$7,350 in anonymous cash rewards approved. In Partnership with the Metro Chiefs & Sheriffs Association, for the last 26 years, \$56,000 in college scholarships have been awarded to 52 area High School Seniors from both Missouri & Kansas.

For over 25 years, MCSP has worked to transform the destructive effects of crime into constructive community aid by allowing offenders to repay their community through service rather than costly incarceration.

- . 2.86 million hours of community service completed
- 104,926 clients served
- . 9.6 million lbs. of litter collected
- \$57.7 million in cost-free labor provided
- . 20+ community worksite partnerships

In the first three months of 2025, MCSP received a total of 217 new referrals and 75 reinstated referrals. MCSP clients have completed 4,686 hours of supervised community service resulting in approximately \$93,720 in cost free labor this year.

SAFE currently provides immediate financial support, in the amount of \$40,000 to the families of local police officers, firefighters, and emergency service personnel killed in the line-of-duty.

- 44 families of fallen first responders served
- Over \$900.000 in immediate financial support provided
- Nearly \$100,000 scholarships awarded to first responder children
- · Ongoing financial support during the holidays is paid each year to 28 families with 27 minor children.

SAFE currently covers 12 counties surrounding the Kansas City metropolitan area and is working to expand. In 2019, SAFE provided support for the first time to a surviving officer with catastrophic injuries. SAFE has undertaken an aggressive education campaign with informational videos, containing survivor stories and printed materials. Additionally, SAFE has developed a resource guide to assist surviving families members.

Second Chance interrupts the cycle of crime by helping citizens returning from incarceration transform into self-sufficient, productive members of our community, Self-sufficiency and employment significantly reduce the risk of re-offending, and Second Chance helps participants overcome common barriers in order to make lasting changes for good.

- Countless crimes prevented through risk reduction services
- 18,218 returning citizens served in some capacity
- Second Chance participant recidivism rate is less than 5% compared to the state recidivism rate of 43.9%
- Less than 95% of participants did not receive another conviction
- In 2024, 70.3% of participants successfully employed
- In 2024, 72.6% of participants had a violent conviction in their criminal profile.
- Over \$69 million in taxpayer dollars saved every year
